### **Academic Benefits**

Regardless of your major, education abroad can provide you with a deeper, and often different understanding of your academic course of study. If you are a marketing major, learning business models and consumer behavior in another country may make you examine how you understand the goals and methods of advertising. If you are a biology major, being in the environment that you have only previously studied in the lab will allow you to interpret data in real time. If you are a history major, having access to different archives and cultural institutions will teach you the value of primary sources. If you are learning a foreign language, cultural immersion will help you reach fluency levels in a shorter span of time. These are just a few examples, but in all cases, studying the same topic in a new academic environment will allow you to become more analytical about your studies and gain firsthand knowledge and insight.

### Career Benefits


# **WHERE TO BEGIN**

#### **Finances**



There is a cost associated with education abroad, but it is possible to find a program that is affordable and fits your needs. Early planning will help you secure the funds you need to go overseas. Speak with staff at the Office of International Affairs to get the facts on financing your education abroad.




#### Here is a list of expenses that you should factor into your budget for education abroad:

- Program Costs (including tuition, room and board)
- Fees for obtaining a visa (if required)



- Immunizations and other pre-departure medical expenses
- Airfare
- Airport transfers (getting to and from the airport)
- Commuting costs in country



- Books
- Technology (cell phone service, Internet, printing fees)
- Additional clothing and supplies
- Personal items
- Entertainment (museum entrance fees, sightseeing, shows)
- Souvenirs
- Additional travel (including housing and meals)













# COMMON CONCERNS

#### Fear of the unknown



Almost everyone who has taken their education abroad will say that they were afraid or anxious before they left. Common fears that students have include fear of flying, fear of new foods, fear of being unable to communicate, fear of being a minority or foreigner important for lt is you acknowledge any worries you may have before addressing them. You are embarking on a journey that will inevitably include high and low moments. It will be easier for you to find meaning in your experience and manage your expectations if you allow yourself to voice and explore your feelings.



#### **Family**



Being away from your family is not easy. "You'll miss your big sister's wedding", "your brother is going off to college at the end of the month". Family members may be upset or disappointed that you have to miss out on major life events, such as weddings or births. It is important acknowledge your family's concerns in a positive way and to them that education remind abroad is a temporary state. One summer, term, or even academic year will go by quicker than anyone can imagine.



#### Friends



Friends provide us with comfort as well as stability; they are there for us when we need them. Make a plan to stay in touch so that your friends can be supportive of your progress abroad. Although education abroad will definitely change you as a person, try to reassure your friends that you will both work hard to maintain the relationship during and after your trip.



## Fraternities and Sororities



Fraternities and sororities have an important cultural and historical role in manv communities, especially in the African American community.lf you are Interested in joining a fraternity sorority, or it important to plan your education abroad early. You should consider creative options accommodate both.



### Political Instability or Unrest



"It's not safe to leave the United States right now". Your family and friends may be concerned about your security and well-being in a foreign country. There are serious and legitimate concerns, but they should not deter you from going. By taking the same precautions you would at home or on campus (e.g., never walking alone at night, remaining vigilant of your surroundings, trusting your instincts, and keeping your cell phone charged) you can be prepared while living and traveling abroad.

# PASSPORT United States of America

### **Passport**

If you don't have a current passport, you will need to apply for one at least six months

before your program departure date. The Office of International Affairs at TSU is a passport facility. You can contact us at 615-963-5640 or stop by the office to make an appointment. We are located on the TSU Main Campus in Holland Hall, Suite 111.

### Visa

Many countries may require you to have a visa to enter and depart within a certain length of time. You can check with your education abroad advisor or the U.S Department of State's website to determine whether you need a visa for entry and exit to complete your study abroad experience.

## **Packing**

Packing the right items will ease your transition into your new environment. Consider your destination carefully. What's the climate like? Is it sunny and tropical, or will it be a long, cold winter? Is extreme weather like hurricanes or monsoons common? In some hot or humid locations, shorts may not be acceptable in public, so opt for pants or longer skirts made of breathable fabrics. For cold climates, avoid bulky items like coats and sweaters, which take up space and may lead to luggage fees. Consider bringing thermal base layers and just two or three sweaters.



Invest in same basics and think about ways to combine a few clothing items into multiple outfits. In all cases, be sure to research the cultural norms regarding attire in your host country.

**Style** 

#### Space

Minimize the items of travel because you will have to carry everything that you pack. You will carry your own suitcase up and downs stairs, on trains, and everywhere else that your journey takes you.



Many students are concerned about maintaining healthy hairstyles during their experience. Consider changing your hairstyle temporarily to something that you can easily maintain.

# EXPERIENCE ABROAD

### **Culture Shock**

The first few days or weeks of your education abroad may be the most difficult emotionally. "Culture shock" is the term used to describe the period of adjustment an individual goes through when confronted with a new host culture and environment. During this time, you may tackle feelings of frustration, isolation, and disorientation as you relearn everything, from a new language to dining etiquette to classroom behaviour. Culture shock is a normal and expected stage of the education abroad experience. Most students find that after a few weeks, they will begin to feel more comfortable in their host country as they become familiar with the cultural landscape and social cues.



## **Host Families**

Many education abroad program offer homestays, where students stay with a host family for deeper levels of immersion. Living with a host family will help you practice your language skills, learn about social values and expectations, and connect to the community faster. Although there are many advantages to staying with a host family, there are some tradeoffs. You may have less privacy than you would in residential halls.



## **Academic Studies**

While you will learn and grow from your engagements with the locals and your peers outside of the classroom, your first priority is to broaden your academic horizons. Work with your academic advisors to ensure that you take on a manageable schedule of courses abroad. Don't overload yourself because you will need time do adjust to the new academic environment and partake in other opportunities to explore your host country.









# **HEALTH AND SAFETY ABROAD**

## **Health Care**

• Before you go, review your current health insurance plan to determine if and how, it will cover you while vou are overseas.

• You may need to purchase supplemental health insurance for your time abroad, including any additional travels that you may do outside of your host country.

· Visit with your doctors for regular check-ups and screenings and take care of any immunization(s) that you may need for you destination.

 If you take regular medications, check to see if you are allowed to bring them into the country and, if so, try to fill your prescriptions to last you the duration of the program.

 Let your mental health care team know that you intend to take your education abroad and develop a plan to stay in touch as well as a plan for emergencies.



## **Racism and Discrimination**

There is a possibility that racial and ethnic minority students may be disproportionately underrepresented in your program, making you feel further isolated. In many cases, your education abroad is equipped to answer questions about racism and discrimination overseas. It is important to investigate race relations in your international destination before you go. There are some reliable, objective resources online that can help you get a sense of the social and cultural atmosphere in your host country.

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
