FOREWORD





Fathom TENNESSEE, the school in your depth imaginings: the Henry Arthur Kean Hall of Health and Physical Education, the Wilfrid W. Lawson Agriculture Building, the Modern Heating Plant, the two new dormitories, the Engineering Building, and the older of the permanent structures (such as the Martha M. 
TECHNOCRACY


TECHNOCRACY is a process of pulling together, of organization, of decision-making, and of problem-solving.

The process includes a weeding-out of the desirable from the undesirable and keeps in mind the whole society (the students, the faculty, the alumni, the community) with which it deals. On the material side there are facilities, supplies, and contracts to be reckoned with.

Since TECHNOCRACY at Tennessee is meted out only after a great deal of pre-season planning and study, it has the respect of every individual who comes under its jurisdiction; every obeyer of law and order. Of the experienced, hand-picked variety, the Tennessee technocrats present a not too formidable front but are the epitomes of those who walk softly while carrying a big stick.







TEXTUALISM

At Tennessee TEXTUALISM is another process. It is one involving students in the more serious aspects of their college residency. Most noteworthy is the fact that it goes beyond the point of a rigid adherence to the letter of the text that is considered basic in textualistic requirements.

And lest we forget . . . TEXTUALISM is the chief reason for being at Tennessee and TEXTUALISM is Tennessee's chief reason for being.




T I M E . . .






There are no boaten paths to glory's height.




TENNESSEE

Beta Chapter at Wiley College was established on November 15, 1915 by Herbert L. Stevens, and authorized by the general board.






BASKETBALL




Again this past summer, Tennessee's Olympic sprinkled Tigerbeiles copped the AAU national crown with a whopping 143 points. This was Tennessee's third straight clean sweep (junior and sonior divisions). While bossing the best in America for the third time, Tennessee's cinder path spendsters blasted three records. This track mastery drew an invitation from Cuba for the Tigerbeiles to dipulay their cinder path style at the Cuban national festival at Havana October 10.

The Edward S. Temple-coached, jet assisted sprintsters so ourclassed the AAU field that Tennessee's blue and white took all six places in the helf-century race, captured first, second, third, and fifth places in both the 100 and 220 yard runs; in addition, they bussed the 440 yard relay, broad jump and hurdles.

Over the five-year span, the Temple-coached girls have done a face lifting job on AAU and American track record books. And now the Tiger-bellos were faced with the task of bettering their own times. Atlanta-born Margarel Matthews opened the finals by erasing Stella Walsh's 19-year-old AAU broad jump with a 19 feet, 5½ inch leap, to start the asseult on the record books.


With an ailing ankle, Itabelle Daniels turned in a blistering 220 yard run. Her 0:24,7 was under the 0:25.1 set by ex-teammate Mae Feggs in 1955, But it was Temple's 440 yard rolay flying quartet [Daniels, Matthews, Bartlera Jones, and Wilma Rudolph) who brought down the house, Pushed by teammates (Tennessee's 8 team) the Tigerbelle senior quartet aided by perfect baton passing, clipped the 440 tape in 0:47.1 and a brand new mark in the final run for the records in the 1957 national AAU outdoor championships.


Previously overshadowed by their female counterparts the Tennessee State "Tiger Thinclads" came out for a little of the publicity this year.

Under the brilliant leadership and guidance of their new coach, Raymond H. Kemp, the Thinclads went on to win the Mid-Western Conference title for the first time.






STEVE'S BIG YEAR . . .

On July 28, Willie Stevens of the A. and I. team and star hurdler in many circles, was chosen to represent the United States in a series of track meets in Europe and the Scandinavian countries. He competed in Berlin, Germany where he ran a 14.1 seconds in the high hurdles. Steve's next stop was Sweden where he competed in ten meets WINNNING THEM ALL. Best time for the Tiger thinclad champ was made in Gavle, Sweden, and Boros, Sweden where he posted times of 13.6 twice, erasing the 20 year old Swedish record as well as the country's stadium record. During his overseas sojourn Stevens, on eight different occasions, was successful in erasing records from the books that had stood for years.

Making his way to Oslo. Norway. Stevens again made with the hills, topping the timbers at 13.6 and coming within two-tenths of a second of the world's record.

Steve's last stop before returning to the States was Denmark where he again ran 13.6 setting off the sparks for his 100 meter run in 10:6 and his broad jump distance of 24 feet 2 inches. Just 2 feet 8 inches shy of the world's record this is a very respectable distance for a man who is not a broad jumper.




Other pool records set by A. & I.'s slippery figersharks during the 1957-58 season are as follows:


How's that right arm holding out?
